GOD OPENS A WINDOW

Holy Week brought a series of storms. Rain was pretty constant. I love the rain, but I also love to get out and take a walk or a run each morning. I went to bed Wednesday night of Holy Week feeling discouraged. The forecast for the next day was rain, which meant no run in the morning. You can imagine how pleasantly surprised I was to wake up, look outside, and see there was no rain. A window had opened up, a brief period of time when there would be a respite from the rain. In no time at all I had my running shorts on, laced up my shoes, and hit the road.

It was a beautiful morning. I ran out to the shores of Lake Houston. Every day outside is a gift, but on this day, when I truly felt like God had opened a window of opportunity, I stopped to give thanks. As I was out on my run, I came upon a man whom I have crossed paths with several times. He loves my running shoes, which are a bright fluorescent green. Once again, he commented on my shoes. Then we began to talk. Our conversation turned to other trails in the area, and he told me about the Lone Star Trail, which he said is up near Conroe and has something like 90 miles of trails. I gave him my email and asked him to send me a note so we could be in touch. He said he would do me one better. He said when the fall rolls around and the weather cools down, he is going to organize a walking trip for the Atascocita Presbyterian Church. Talk about God opening a window! I hope you open a window on your calendar and save that date in October. What fun to explore God's good creation.

I said goodbye to Joe, my new friend, and began my journey home. One of the favorite parts of my homeward bound run is that I cross what Julie has named "Turtle Bridge." The little stream under the bridge has at times 30-40 turtles paddling about. When the bridge came into view, I realized there were more than turtles this day. A baby deer was feeding in the grass next to the bridge. I stopped on the bridge, grateful that God had opened yet another window, a chance to look at this beautiful deer. Then I saw the deer had a partner. That pair of deer let me stare in wonder to my heart's content. I cannot see a deer without being reminded of the beautiful psalm, "As the deer pants for streams of water, so my soul pants for you, O Lord." The longing for God is a good longing, a pure longing, a holy longing. And God is there to fill that desire. The day God opened all these windows was the Thursday of Holy

Resting on that bridge, Turtle Bridge as Julie calls it, mesmerized by the deer, sharing in the joy of countless turtles bobbing and weaving in the water, thinking back on my chance encounter with my new friend Joe, and realizing that I never would have enjoyed such a perfect morning if God had not opened a window, I said a heartfelt prayer of thanksgiving to God.

Maundy Thursday...Holy Week...Good Friday...in a very real sense, Holy Week is all about doors closing. Each day is one step closer to the cross. Each day is one step closer to the tomb. Each day is one step closer to the stone being slammed in front of the grave. That is the ultimate closing of a door, the death of Jesus. With Easter in mind, the saying that when God closes a door, he opens a window becomes so much more than just another pious religious saying. The window of the resurrection is such a sign of hope. We thought all hope was gone. We thought we had seen the last of Jesus.

I was so happy when God opened a window that Maundy Thursday so I could go on a run. Can you even imagine the joy I felt a few days later when God opened the window wide open, raising Jesus from the dead? For me, it is not just a religious truism that when God shuts a door, he opens a window. For me, this is the great good news that through Jesus Christ, life has conquered death.



From Your Earth Care Team

Facilities Committee is 'Greening' APC

The APC Facilities Committee is working hard to both beautify our church and make it more energy efficient.



New Plantings – Parsley hawthorn shrubs have been added to the bed along Atasca Oaks in the continuing work to convert the bed to all native plantings.

G.A.T.E. Area – A workday will be scheduled soon to clean up the G.A.T.E., add additional granite to the pathways, expand the seating in the stage area, and clean out dead undergrowth.

Outside Lighting – The parking lot lights and five fixtures on the building have been replaced by highefficiency LED lights to reduce our energy usage and provide more lighting as we safely return to our cars after dark.

Inside Lighting – All the fixtures in one classroom have been converted to LED lighting, and plans are in progress to convert the 30 fixtures in the remaining classrooms, generating more light while reducing energy usage by 75% and the maintenance time and costs to replace, and to dispose of, fluorescent tubes.

Solar Power – We've retained a consultant for obtaining bids from reliable installers for a solar panel system and explore options to lease or purchase. The tentative system would generate about 36% of our current annual usage and be eligible for the 30% Federal Solar Tax Credit.[A larger solar system doesn't make economic sense under current "buyback" contracts for excess electricity generated during low-usage months.]

Recycling and Reusing – Although we can no longer accept batteries and fluorescent tubes for recycling, because of fees charged for disposal, we continue to recycle paper, cardboard, and plastic used during worship services, meals, and church activities. We use reusable dishes and utensils for most meals and clean them in our sanitizing dishwasher. We accept old electronics anytime – leave them in the A/V closet, the first door on the left as you enter the church.

If you're interested in being part of APC's Earth Care Team, let us know and plan to attend the next meeting on May 11 at 7 pm, either in-person or by ZOOM.
