
Peace and Global Witness Special Offering

The Peace & Global Witness Offering is one of four annual special offerings. The campaign begins Sunday, September 3 and runs through October 1. The church-wide Special Offerings of the PC(USA) play an important role in defining what it means to be a connectional church in the twenty-first century, bringing together the diversity of the PC(USA) to focus and take faith-based action on shared concerns.

The Peace & Global Witness Offering draws Presbyterians together as active peacemakers, and provides education and interaction with those who show us how to do this work well. It allows us to create resources for dealing with conflict while nurturing reconciliation, and standing in support of our siblings around the world, because the peace of Christ belongs to people everywhere.

Twenty-five percent of this Offering stays with APC to support peacemaking and reconciliation in our own community. Twenty-five percent goes to our mid-council to join with other congregations to support peacemaking work in our region. Fifty percent supports the work being done by Presbyterians across the globe. Why it is Important to Use "Green" Cleaning Products at Church and at Home

I have been trying to be more earth friendly in my daily life over the past few years. In our house we do the usual: recycling, reduce the use of single use water bottles, eat organic products as much as possible, and..... the list can be quite long. The last time I attended an EarthCare Committee meeting at church, we were bouncing ideas on what we could do to improve our commitment to the EarthCare label. I suggested that we could use more "green" cleaning products, and I was then asked to do a little research and write an article about it.

For me, using green cleaning products is a no brainer, but it was interesting to find more legitimate reasons. I will start with the obvious – everyday cleaning products. You can revert to using vinegar, baking soda, or castile soap, with tea tree oil. There are lots of DIY recipes for cleaning products online. If you don't have time to play chemist in your kitchen, you can just buy safe-to-use products from almost any store. According to the site, "Clean Water Action (1)," you may

want to consider the following when buying green cleaning products:

- Non-toxic
- Biodegradable
- Phosphate Free
- Recycled content containers
- Bulk packaging
- Natural fragrances
- Contains no dyes, chlorine, or hypochlorite (bleach)
- Full disclosure or labeling of "active" and "inert" ingredients.

But the real reason for using green cleaning products is geared more towards health and safety. Traditional chemicals found in cleaning products have been found to trigger or reinforce several medical issues like asthma, cancer, and of course, accidental burns or poisoning (2).

They are also linked to reproductive and developmental toxicity, allergies, and irritations. The thought of having a lot of children being present at church during the day at CLC or during the quarterly visit of families with children during our Family Promise rotation, are reasons enough to want to switch to less harmful cleaning products.

Although this would be ideal, there is one important factor why the switch to less harmful cleaning products has not happened yet, and it is the cost. The price of green products could be considerably more than regular products. This is due, in part, to high manufacturing costs. For example, it costs more to extract ingredients from plants than using synthetic ones (3). The resources used can also be limited.

In the end, it is about the balance of what you can do for the environment, and making sure it fits your budget. You can start small and switch one green product for a regular product in your household and see if that can be sustainable for you.
