EVEN A CUP OF COLD WATER

It feels like pretty much everyone else has had to deal with it, so I guess it only seems fair that I got my turn. I had to wait 63 years, but on March 12, 2024 I received my first cast. And with the cast came a pair of crutches. I thought my problem was with a tendon that was thinning on the ball of my left foot. And yet once I received the crutches, I realized I also have had a lifelong problem with my vision. In

other words, having to navigate the world on a set of crutches has been an eye-opening experience.

I never realized the challenge it is to open a door when you are on crutches. Between the need to get out the key card, swipe the card, swiftly rush over and pull the door open, which I have found is nearly impossible, I have not been able to enter the church on my own. Thankfully, and I do mean thankfully, someone has been there to open the door. When I pull into church I am almost overwhelmed with joy when I see Carroll's car. Carroll drops everything and meets me at the door to let me in. Cathy Gerald was there one day. That day turned out to be very special. I entered through the preschool door. The class whose window looks out on the sidewalk saw me hobbling up on my crutches. Immediately ten little faces were pressed against the window. Their looks of concern, and the smiles that followed when they found out I was going to survive my "injury" truly made my day. The old saying has become real to me in a new way. I never knew the myriad of challenges that face someone on crutches until I hobbled a few steps in those shoes.

Because we live in a townhouse, all of our mail is delivered to a set of mailboxes in the front part of our complex. When Julie was in Guatemala, I had to pick up the mail. I would drive my car and park as close to the mailboxes as possible. With mail key in hand, I would get out of the car on my crutches and scramble the few steps to the box. At this point I faced the challenge of propping myself up on one crutch and using the key to open the box, remove the mail, and somehow throw the mail from where I was standing into the car because I couldn't hold both the mail in my hand and use the crutches. Who would have ever known the struggle...unless you have also walked a mile on someone's crutches. One day I pulled up to get the mail, a young woman, probably still in her teens, saw me trying to get out of the car with the crutches. She immediately intervened. "Here, give me your mail key and I'll get it for you."

We have a small lake in the center of our townhouses. I have been trying to get out and exercise just a bit by making a loop on my crutches. In case you are wondering, it takes 468 crutch-steps to circumnavigate the lake. But who's counting? One morning as I made my way out of our small street toward the lake, a car drove past me. Some ten yards after passing me, the driver stopped the vehicle. He rolled down the window. He looked at me and asked, "Can I give you a ride somewhere?" I told him that I was heading out for a little exercise. He smiled, waved, and passed on. But he stopped. He stopped to see if he could help. I thought of that one small gesture during each of my 468 crutch-steps that morning.

Getting to church, hopping out of my car, navigating those intimidating doors, and clip copping all the way to my office is enough to wear me out. One day I sat down at my desk, feeling like I had just summitted Mount Everest. I plopped into my chair. I began to sort through the papers on my desk. At that moment Carroll walked in. She had a cup of water. She had a cup of ice-cold water. Oh my goodness! Hot, tired, worn out, spent from my labors, someone brought me a cup of cold water. Maybe that is what this article is all about. When Jesus wanted to let his disciples know the importance of every act of kindness, every act of compassion, every act of concern, Jesus commended to his disciples someone who gives even a cup of cold water to a person in need. Having walked a mile on a set of crutches, I now have discovered how very important a cup of cold water truly is, and a helping hand with a door, and an offer to grab the mail, and a window rolled down with an invitation to take a ride if you need it.

Romans 12 is a beautiful chapter about how being drawn into the Body of Christ gives us the chance to work together, to use our gifts to build up the body, to love and learn and serve and give, all in the name of Jesus Christ. Verse 13 in the twelfth chapter of Romans ends with a two-word sentence. That two-word sentence packs a punch. "Practice hospitality."

Am I glad I am crutches? No. No, I'm not glad I am on crutches. But am I learning through this experience? Oh yes, indeed I am. Walking a mile on someone else's crutches has opened my eyes in some wonderful ways, allowing me to experience countless acts of kindness from folks who saw my need and have reached out. Someday I'll be back on two good feet. Someday I'll put the crutches away. But I pray to God that I remember what others are going through, whether it is crutches or cancer, loneliness or the loss of loved ones, a broken relationship or a bruised heart. I sure hope I will remember what a gift it was when someone saw me hobbling along and took a moment to help. Thank you to each one for all the ways you have supported and encouraged me as I am walking this mile on crutches. Your kindness and your countless acts of hospitality have touched my heart.

B.O.P.A. & National Drug Take-Back Day Kingwood Green Recycling Center on Kingwood Drive behind the Kingwood Community Center.

B.O.P.A. is: batteries, motor or cooking oil, old latex (water-based) paint & antifreeze. These hazardous items should never end up in our trash. City of Houston Solid Waste Management Department will be at the Kingwood Metro lot from 9 am to 1 pm to collect and recycle these items. **The event ends promptly at 1 pm.**

Pete with "Junky Business" will also be there to recycle your scrap metal and clean, empty appliances. If you have a large appliance you need picked up prior to B.O.P.A. call Pete at 832-377-5865. (there may be a charge depending on distance & item.)

Also, **Annual Prescription Drug Take-Back Day!** The Houston Police Dept in cooperation with the US Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) will collect unused or expired medications at the Metro lot **from 10 am to 2 pm.** No identification required. All prescription drugs and over-the-counter medication will be responsibly disposed. No questions asked! All items collected are incinerated. These items should never be flushed down the drain or put into trash.
