After worship on Sunday, March 8, which I have already testified to you was a wonderful day of blessing in worship, a day when 84 of you got it right and sprung forward, even at the cost of a precious hour of sleep, and on a Sunday when the Burgos family blessed us in such an inspiring and heartwarming manner, I found God had yet one more blessing to bestow. I walked to my office after worship to take off my robe and prepare to go home. As I passed the copy room, I looked in, not really for any reason other than I have a habit of glancing at every room that has an open door. When I glanced at the copy room, I saw a breathtaking sight. The clock in the copy room, which had been set to the wrong time for more than four months, was now miraculously set to the correct time. I chuckled to myself as the old adage came to mind, "Even a stopped clock is right twice a day."

Well, if you know the mind of a preacher, one thought leads to another, and in seconds flat, I guess you could say in no time at all, all I could think about was time, especially the kind of time we encounter in the Bible.

- There I was with the preacher in Ecclesiastes reflecting how for everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven. Just like the words to the well-known song made famous in the 60s, "A time to be born, a time to die..."
- My time travels took me to the days of the King Hezekiah, who answered God's offer of a sign by asking that the shadow before him retreat rather than advance...sort of like us having a time when we fall back...and sure enough, the shadow went back ten steps.
- I found myself back in Genesis chapter one during the time of those seven days of creation, again chuckling to myself as I remembered a corny joke my dad liked to tell. "When is baseball mentioned in the Bible." For all of you Astros fans looking forward with hope to another season cheering on the home team, the punchline isn't too hard to figure out. Baseball is first mentioned in Genesis 1:1, "In the Beginning," or "In the Big Inning."
- Jesus tells a parable about being on time. Ten bridesmaids are waiting for the bridegroom. Five have not planned appropriately, their lamps run out of oil. As they rush off to refill their lamps, the bridegroom arrives and they are not there; they are late, they are not on time and they miss out. In no uncertain terms Jesus tells us we better pay attention to the times around us, because when he returns he wants us all to be on time, to be ready.
- And yet, even when it is too late, with Jesus, there always seems to be a second chance. Hanging on the cross, suffering and in pain, when the thief on the cross next to him asks Jesus to remember him when he comes into the kingdom, we discover the time was just right for that thief who almost missed the deadline. Jesus says, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."
- All of which is to say there is still time for you, still time for me, still time for us, still time for all God's precious children who populate this earth as a sea of humanity. In II Corinthians chapter six, the Apostle Paul proclaims,

"At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you. See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation." No matter what season of the year, no matter what time of the day, no matter whether you are in the winter, spring, summer or fall of life, there is no wrong time to call on God. Anytime is the right time to call on God. Today is the day of salvation. Now is the time to call on the Lord.

In closing, I am thankful we get to share this precious time together as brothers and sisters in Christ. This is a rich and wonderful time for us, and even though time flies by so quickly, I treasure each and every moment of our life together.

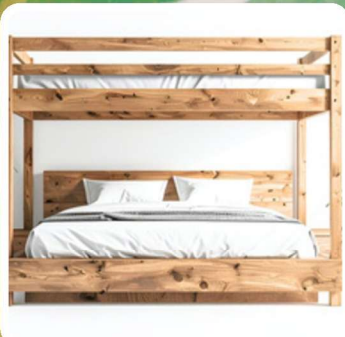

The Reverend Dr. Ryan Arnold serves as vice president for institutional advancement at Austin Seminary. An ordained minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), he holds a PhD in education from Drake University. His background includes pastoral ministry and higher education administration, and he brings a passion for building relationships, fostering community engagement, and exploring how education shapes lives.


Later that afternoon, everyone is invited to join the wider presbytery community for "Theology on Tap" at 2:00 pm at Drops of the Creator Spirits Company, 10929 Chimney Rock in southwest Houston.

The gathering will feature President José Irizarry and Dean Margaret Aymer, who will lead an engaging conversation on faith, ministry, and theological imagination. It promises to be a lively and meaningful time of connection with friends from across the region.

The Reverend Dr. José Ramon Irizarry became Austin Seminary's tenth president in June 2022. Since 2016, Irizarry has served as vice president of education at the Board of Pensions of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). A scholar in the field of practical theology, Irizarry taught at Villanova University and has held teaching and administrative positions at various educational and theological institutions, including the University of Cambridge (Visiting Fellow), Lutheran School of Theology, the Pacific School of Religion, and McCormick Theological Seminary.



THE REVEREND DR. MARGARET AYMER
VICE PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

The Reverend Dr. Margaret Aymer serves as vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculty, and is the First Presbyterian Church, Shreveport, D. Thomason Professor of New Testament Studies. Aymer teaches core courses on the Introduction to the New Testament, Exegesis, and Greek, as well as elective courses in various disciplines, including African Americans and the Bible, and feminist and womanist biblical interpretation. She became academic dean at Austin Seminary in 2022—the first woman and the first person of color to hold that position. Aymer has published four books: *James: Diaspora Rhetorics of a Friend of God* (Sheffield Publishing, 2014), *Fortress Commentary on the Bible* (with Gale A. Yee, Fortress Press, 2014); *First Pure, then Peaceable: Frederick Douglass Reads James* (T&T Clark, 2008), and *Islanders, Islands and the Bible: Ruminations* (Semeia Studies, 2015; with Jione Havea).

SAFETY moment

As we move into a busy spring season, it's a good time to pause and think about the simple skills that help us care for one another — both in daily life and in moments we never expect.

One of the most important tools any of us can learn is CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation). Sudden cardiac emergencies can happen anywhere: at home, at church, at school, or in the community. When they do, the first few minutes matter more than anything else. A bystander who knows CPR can double or even triple a person's chance of survival.

Learning CPR doesn't require medical training or special equipment — just a willingness to step in and help until professional responders arrive. It's a skill that empowers us to protect our families, our neighbors, and our church community. In the coming months, we encourage everyone to consider taking a CPR class or refreshing a past certification. It's a small investment of time that can make a life-changing difference.

Together, we can create a safer, more prepared congregation—one where care, readiness, and compassion are part of how we live out our faith.

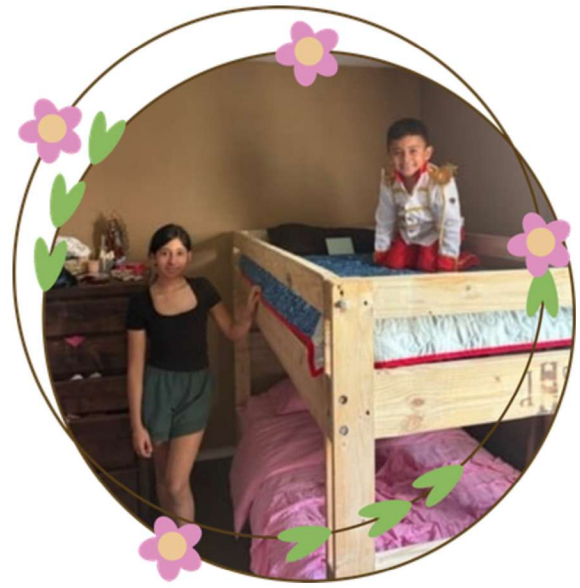

The Blessing Box

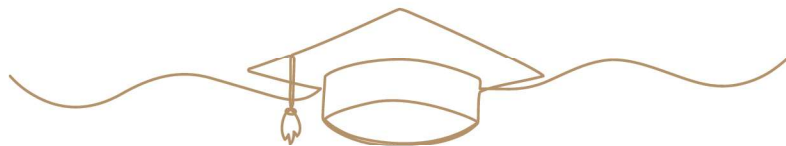
We're inviting our church family to help keep the **Blessing Box** stocked with items that support neighbors facing food insecurity.

Key Houston Hunger Facts

- **High-Need Areas:** In the Greenspoint/IAH neighborhood, 4 out of 5 households (80%) are food insecure.
- **Childhood Hunger:** As of 2023, 24.6% of children in Harris County (over 306,000) are food insecure.
- **Disparities:** Food insecurity is highest among Black (53%) and Hispanic (47%) households.
- **Economic Drivers:** Around 81% of people facing food insecurity in the Houston metroplex spend over 50% of their income on housing.
- **Daily Struggles:** 97% of food-insecure households report cutting meal sizes or skipping meals, while 96% report eating less nutritious food.
- **Health Impacts:** 29% of food-insecure residents in Harris County report poor or fair physical health, compared to 12% in secure households.
- **Food Deserts:** Over 500,000 residents live in areas with limited access to fresh, affordable food.

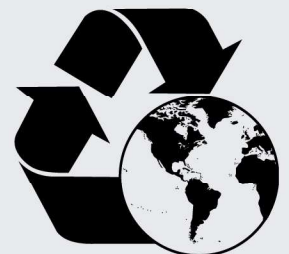

Amazing Aluminum Recycling!

Aluminum is one of the most recycled materials in the world. Nearly 70% of aluminum cans are recycled globally — yet the United States recycles only about 43%. Aluminum is also one of the few materials we throw away that more than pays for the cost of its own collection!

Did you know...

- 100% of aluminum can be recycled.
- Aluminum retains its properties indefinitely — it never wears out.
- Nearly 75% of all aluminum ever produced is still in use today.
- Aluminum can be recycled infinitely with no loss of quality.
- Recycling is fast: it takes only about 60 days for a used can to be recycled and returned to store shelves.
- Recycling aluminum uses just 5% of the energy required to produce new aluminum from raw materials.
- Recycling emits 95% fewer greenhouse gases compared to producing aluminum from virgin ore.
- Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to power a TV for several hours.
- Recycling one ton of aluminum prevents carbon emissions equivalent to driving approximately 27,000 miles.



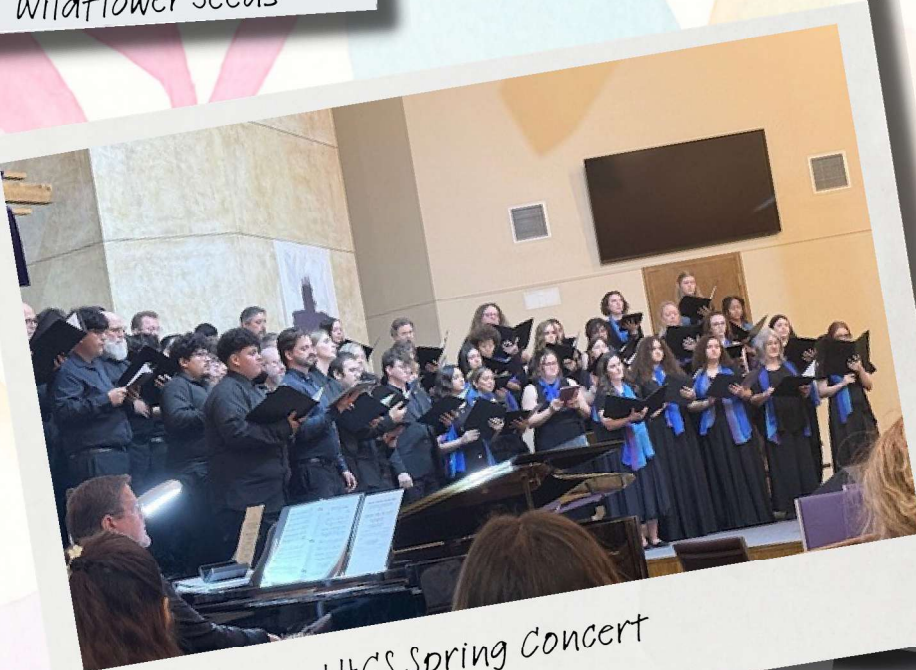

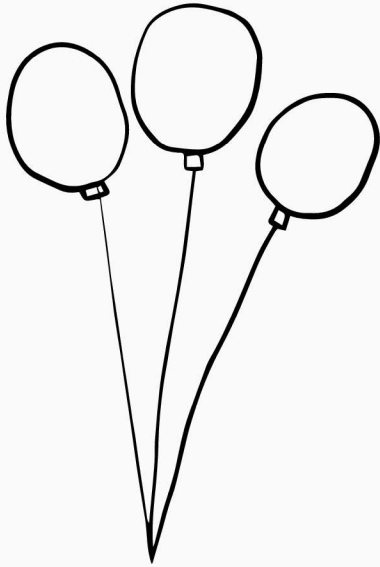

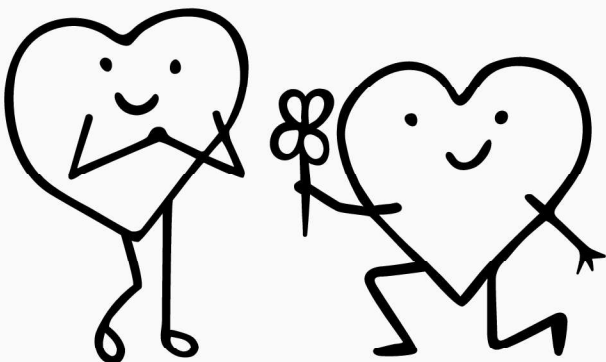
